


DEAR FRIENDS,

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It's Back....Hurricane Season

Hurricane season starts June 1st through November 30th. It is time to stock up on your hurricane supplies, prepare for this season, and protect yourself, your family, and your property. Directions: <u>Cook squash until done using method you prefer</u> (bake, boil, steam, microwave). I prefer to bake squash at 450 degrees for about 30 minutes. Cut into halves and bake face down on baking sheet. Spread each half with olive oil before baking. When squash is nearly done, sauté onion, green pepper, and garlic in olive oil until tender. Stir in tomatoes, oregano, and basil and simmer for 5 minutes. Shred squash with fork in shell. Toss with butter. Spoon mixture on top of squash, keeping all ingredients inside the squash halves. Add salt or Parmesan cheese (if desired).


